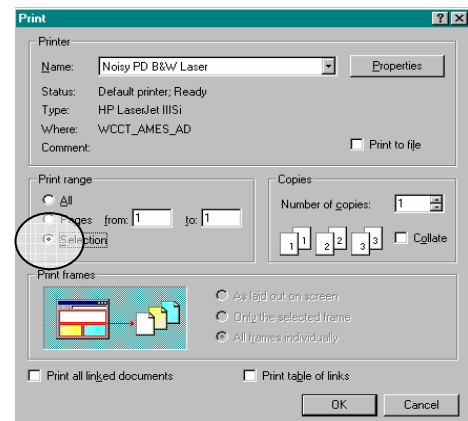

Remember that if you want to print this off the web, then don't print the whole exercise from Internet Explorer but Cut & Paste what you need into Word and edit as desired. You may see some strange codes which need deleting.

{Alternatively, you can select the section you want by dragging over it and then go to the pull-down menu by:

- clicking on File
- clicking on Print
- clicking on Selection
- clicking on OK.}

Add music or pre-recorded sound effects

NB: You can only add music or narration, not both.

NB2: One thing you can't do with MovieMaker is to separate the sound from the image that you have taken with your camera. This means that you can't insert different clips (like "noddies" in news reports) and keep the sound intact.

You can however, dub sound over the movie in the program.

NB3: You can mute the sound on either or both soundtracks by right-clicking on it in the "Timeline" view.
